

Examples of Unofficial Payment Requests from ‘Scam’ Official Intellectual Property Organisations

We have become increasingly aware that unofficial firms and individuals are sending out invoices requesting payment for the publication and/or registration of patents, trade marks and designs.

These misleading payment requests pose as official correspondence and often contain names and logos very similar to those of official IP organisations. They can be very misleading (which is putting it kindly, at best) and are often sent directly to clients.

Official communications in respect of your cases should always come via HGF. If you receive any official-looking correspondence that you are unsure about please do not make any payment. Instead, please contact HGF as soon as possible so we can check it for you. For some examples and further information, please see below.

Most recently, fraudulent European Patent Office (EPO) and Office for Harmonisation in the Internal Market (OHIM) invoices are being sent to UK based companies and individuals. These invoices are almost identical to the real thing; it is only the bank account details that are different.
